

Prestigious win for UCC finance team

A TEAM of students from Accounting & Finance have won the Irish round of the CFA institute's Global Investment Research Challenge (GIRC) held at Davys Stockbrokers.

The team comprises Aoife McCarthy, Ava Gaffney, Cormac O'Flynn, David Nunan and Robert Sweeney. Their professional mentor is Ken Power of Killeevan Investment Consultants and their academic mentor is Dr Ray Donnelly.

The team's financial analysis of Origin Enterprises plc came out on top, defeating teams from NUI, Galway, Trinity College Dublin, and Smurfit Business School in the final.

The Global Investment Research Challenge is a real world investment competition, with over 3,200 students from more than 700 of the top university business and finance programs in 55 countries participating this year.

The universities assemble teams of three to five business and finance students who work directly with a company in researching and preparing a company analysis. The teams' final presentations are locally evaluated by high-profile panels of heads of research, portfolio managers and chief investment officers from the world's top firms.

Lecture to focus on the generating power of sea waves

THANKS to electricity, our society has changed more in a century than in a millennium.

However, massive challenges lie ahead: oil and gas resources are depleting dramatically, not to mention the threat of climate change.

In the next lecture of the Annual College of Science, Engineering and Food Science (SEFS) Public Lecture Series on Wednesday, titled: 'Sea Waves are Tomorrow's Oil', Anne Blavette will give an insight into the cutting-edge research of ocean electricity.

According Blavette: "Electricity producers worldwide are to renewables, turning which Ireland is fortunately blessed with, having in particular one of the best wave energy potential in the world. However, contrary to coal or gas-fired power plants, ocean power plants have some characteristics that require changing the traditional way to operate the electrical network", she explained.

Anne Blavette holds a BSc in Physics from the University of Rennes, Brittany, France, and a MScE in Energy Engineering EPF-Engineering from School in Paris. She is now a third-year PhD candidate at the Hydraulics and Maritime Research Centre, UCC. Her PhD work focuses on the electrical grid impact of electricity generated from ocean energy converters.

The lecture will be delivered at 8pm in Boole IV Lecture Theatre. The lecture series is organised by Emeritus Professor William Reville, Public Awareness of Science Officer, SEFS and will continue until March 14.

A NEW, international, peer-reviewed journal edited by Dr Mark Chu of UCC's Department of Italian, was presented in the Italian Senate recently by Emma Bonino, vice-president of the senate and former EU Commissioner.

Todomodo, founded by Francesco Izzo of the Amici di Leonardo Sciascia, and published by the prestigious Florentine academic publisher Leo S. Olschki, is dedicated to the critical study of the life and works of the Sicilian author, Leonardo

Sciascia (1921-1989).

The journal was officially launched in Florence in November 2011, and presented in Cork talian Studies in Ireland Research Colloquium on earlier this month.

The event at the Italian Senate is indicative of Sciascia's importance as a writer and political commentator.
